Type of people

- •They are domestic workers, daily wagers, rikshaw pullers, construction workers, pregnant women, malnutrition children etc.
- •Children are forced to work along with their parents to meet the both ends.
- •There is lack of motivation for parents to educate their children.
- •The literacy rate of these migrants is very low.
- •Covid-19 affected very badly and made many of them unemployed





Justification

Covid - 19 affected locals especially those who try to make their living on daily wage or domestic work. They all lost their work due to the pandemic and they find it difficult to meet their daily needs. They look for people for support so as to feed their children. Seeing and understanding this situation, BREAD India distributed them dry ration kit containing rice, wheat flour, pulses, oil, sugar, tea powder etc.





































Medical equipment/medical kits/medicines distribution

During the peak time of the second wave of corona virus, BREAD India, identified the need of the hour and distributed medical equipment to different hospitals and dispensaries in the state of Jharkhand and Delhi NCR which did not have much essential medical facilities. BiPAP machine, ventilator, ICU beds, pulse oximeter, oxygen cylinders, wheelchair, ECG machine, hot air oven hospital beds, IV stands, BP apparatus, glucometers, stethoscope, BP apparatus, storage shelf and few other equipment for lab were distributed to them. 300 medicines kits also were distributed for the parents of children studying in the nonformal centers in Delhi NCR







Children experience poverty differently from adults. Their needs, expectations, and aspirations are different. It is therefore important to directly assess their material shortcomings and deprivations or measure their multidimensional poverty. Nevertheless, in the context of the current COVID-19 pandemic, as parents lose their jobs and sources of income, it is also important to support children living in monetary poor and impoverished households by the way of Mother's Care Programme making sure their basic educational needs are met and their studies are not stopped. BREAD India distributed Mother's Care scholarship to 1916 children in different parts of India during this year.

- Hence Mother's Care project helps them to purchase their basic educational stationaries and it would help them to continue their education and to have a bright future.
- Mother's care is an incentive to minimize lack of attendance.
- Mother's Care educational assistance is a boost to the children, family and the community.
- No children is dropped out due to lack of funds.
- Direct beneficiary scheme makes sure his/her share of financial assistance in his/her personal bank account.






























The continued DISTURBANCE of the Covid pandemic brought the school to a standstill due to lockdown and due to shortage of online classroom facilities, like computers and android mobile phones. There was no proper teaching due to lack of digital gadgets. Computers have become the nerve center of modern classroom and online teaching. Thus CDM school Kuakhera was equipped to have computer lab for online classes providing five android phones and ten systems. These would enable the staff to prepare class plans and make it available both online.







Chanro, Jharkhand

Project Location:

Shanti Niketan Primary School is situated in Chanro village at Ramgarh block in the district of Palmau in the state of Jharkhand, India. Chanro is 28 kms from district Head Quarter Daltonganj. Nearest railway station is Daltonganj, 28 km from Chanroh. There are 11 villages around this school and approximately 1200 houses and this is only school for these villages where education takes place.

Languages spoken here are Hindi and Palamuha, a dialect of the people. The transportation facilities are very much limited, and people have to go walking to the nearest market about 5 kms. The weekly market is also 5 km away. People make use of the tractors and small goods carriers for the mode of transportation. The people are daily labourers and small-scale farmers. The cultivation depends on the rain which is very often erratic. This leads to draught and consequently famine. Migration is also very rampant in these villages.

This school is in a remote area and located amidst Jungles. The students come from far villages, even 10 kms far from the school.



Type children:

At present, there are 235 students attending regular classes. Most of the students belong to scheduled tribes, scheduled casts and primitive tribes. The prominent tribes are Kherwar, Chero, Korwa, Asur. Students join the school in late age due to lack of facilities and awareness. Most of the children are from poor families and from remote villages. Along with education they are compelled to work for the daily food. It is heartening to see the enthusiasm of children coming to school. Scheduled tribe students are more than other students. Students come to school walking and they don't have proper roads and transportation. They are also prone to malaria, malnutrition etc. Though students are poor and come from far, there is lot of interest and enthusiasm seen on the faces of these children.



Justification:


Shanti Niketan School was started 21 years ago with the initiatives of the villagers. People came forward offering land for the school and putting up a mud house. The school is run with community participation. The school does not have proper infrastructure. It has a mud house of five rooms. Students bring sacks to the school to sit. They sit on the floor and study. The regular repair and maintenance of this mud house is done by the villagers. The mud wall of the school is very often spoiled by rain. The classrooms are very small and dingy. There is no corridor for the school building. Today the building is in a dilapidated condition. It may not survive any longer and this can affect the education of so many children. A minimum bricks construction with truss and iron sheet will surely help continuation of education of so many children in this remote area. This will be a big centre of learning and social change in future. Shanti Niketan School is the only hope for the people. Though the school building is of mud and in a very poor condition, children come to school, because classes are regularly conducted.

LIVING IN HOPE

Amar Khan, eight years old is partially blind from birth. He lives with his parents and other five siblings in a slum in Sagam Vihar, southern part of Delhi. His dad is part-time "handy man" for electrical works. The family manages hardly one square meal a day.

Delhi, the capital of India is teeming with people. It has more than 13 million and still growing mostly out of migration from villages. When the lockdown was imposed at the 1st wave of pandemic, the families, like of Amar Khan were forced to migrate back to their native States. Many had to walk hundreds of miles, even as far back as Bihar; one of the least developed States in India.

As the pandemic seem to have subsided there was a reserve migration with greater force and desperation few months ago including that of Amar Khan's family. The mother of Amar Khan said; "When we went back to our village, there was nothing to eat; it was terrible situation than in Delhi slums, she added. Amar Khan said "I was longing for at least for the dry ration received under the mary's meals. But even that was not available in our far-off village in Bihar."


but the poor slum dwellers are in rude shock for the sky-rocketing of essential commodities in the month of March,2022 due to Russian invasion of Ukraine. These innocent ones, who have never ever heard of Ukraine are bearing the ripple effect of the war in a far-off slum.

"At least my child can have a hot cooked meal, thanks to the slum school which provides marys meals in Sagam Vihar," on the southern part of Delhi, added his dad with a grateful heart.

It is sad that in the event of a catastrophe it is the poor who suffer, the most; be it Corona or invasion of Ukraine. The poor ones in the far-flung regions have to pay a heavy price in terms of hunger and poverty. Thanks to silver linings like mary's meals, at least the children are able to receive some food, if not to fill their stomach but to satiate their hunger.

Amar Khan like children feel happy that at least he can look forward to a hot meal in his classroom. I was reminded of the spirit of Job 1: 21 in the Old Testament: "Naked I came from my Mother's womb, naked shall I depart."
